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Assistive technology and adaptive equipment (information and funding sources - includes computers, tablets, and internet) and Remote Supports and Remote Services.

The Federal Affordable Connectivity Program

Local non-profit has a program called "Every1Online" that offers free-Wi-Fi to residents in need who reside within their network areas. Serves residents in Homewood, Wilkinsburg, New Ken, Coraopolis and more.

Caregiver support for all, Parent/Family Support Groups, Special Education related groups

<u>PA Parent and Family Alliance Family Support Partners (FSPs)</u> can deliver peer to peer support to the families who are caring for children and young adults (up to age 26) with identified or suspected social, emotional, behavioral, or mental health challenges. This is inclusive of learning and attention issues, as well as substance use disorders.

Virtual Parent Support Group

The Trees Network hosts a virtual parent support group the first Monday of each month. The group connects parents to others who are facing/faced similar experiences. Caregiver Solutions™

AARP, United Way SWPA, and Northern Area Multi Service Center (NAMS), have collaborated to launch a Caregiver Support Program for informal caregivers. The Caregiver Support Program provides informal caregivers and care recipients, 18 years of age and older, living in Allegheny, Armstrong, Beaver, Butler, Fayette, Greene, Indiana, Lawrence, Mercer, Washington and Westmoreland counties, a proactive and realistic approach for reducing stress and improving outcomes. Professional Care Consultants coordinate and help prioritize concerns, provide resources, develop a step by step action plan, while providing emotional support throughout the process – all by telephone. Help is just a phone call away, and there is no fee for this service. If you are an informal caregiver and would like support through your caregiving journey, please dial 412-781-5002 to connect with the Caregiver Support Program.

<u>988 is here</u> Pennsylvanians have a new, easier way to connect to mental or behavioral health crisis services. Dialing 988 will connect callers directly to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline.

Caregiver Support Programs (CSPs) exist for caregivers who are 55 and older and also who are adults 18 and older. The range of benefits is wide and varied. Some things participants are eligible for are case management, trainings and assistance completing benefits and insurance forms. CSPs may offer a monthly reimbursement for out-of-pocket care-giving supplies, reimbursement for hiring someone to provide care and reimbursement grants to make the home safer and more accessible with home modifications or assistive devices. The Local Task Force (LTF) is a Parent / Family Support Network Group for family members supporting a school age child with a disability. LTF membership includes parents and family members of children with disabilities, local school system / intermediate unit representatives, and other helping professionals. There are two LTFs in Allegheny County and each holds monthly meetings during the school year and offers a Parent Assistance Line. PGH LTF (LTF2) covers Pittsburgh Public School District and LTF3 supports all other districts. Both meetings often offer guest speakers and / or presentations. Also, at the LTF 2 and 3 meetings you'll have the opportunity to be supported in understanding more about regulations and special education processes such as Evaluations Reports, IEPs and NOREPs, have your concerns or questions regarding the special education system heard and learn about helpful services and supports outside of the school system.
